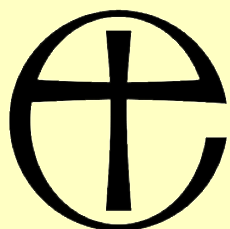

*From Rev'd Robin Davill*



Dear Friends

Many thanks to John for last month flagging up the importance of football to many of us, and how sport is very much interwoven with religious faith. So many famous football clubs were founded by churches and chapels, Aston Villa, Barnsley, Everton, Manchester City and Southampton to name but a few. So, following John's lead, I would like to look at how important sport has become to us.

Over the years since the Middle Ages, the concept of sport has changed considerably and originally it was more associated with hunting and such activities as bull and bear baiting. Football and cricket in their early basic form were rather more spontaneous affairs associated often with rowdy behaviour and often frowned upon by the more well to do. It was the Victorians, and British Victorians at that, who gave the world sport as we know it today. They codified the rules, founded proper clubs, and formed associations to govern and promote it. Moreover, it became a central part of the curriculum of all public and grammar schools.

***There's a breathless hush in the Close tonight  
Ten to make and the match to win  
A bumping pitch and a blinding light  
An hour to play and the last man in.  
And it's not for the sake of a ribboned coat,  
Or the selfish hope of a season's fame,  
But his Captain's hand on his shoulder smote  
"Play up! play up! and play the game."***

Victorian educators, many of them clergy, believed that sport was not only good for exercise and health, but also for sound morals and faith. Muscular Christianity, as it was known, was a very popular movement throughout education and the sporting world. Cricket in particular was promoted in Britain and its empire as a means of moral improvement, by encouraging fair play and sportsmanlike behaviour. Titus Salt, in his model town of Saltaire, built a large cricket ground where both workers and managers in his mill could play on equal terms. Building sports clubs was an important way to attract church goers. More recently my nephews played football for St John's Church football club in Penistone – along with a certain John Stones, later of Manchester City and England. I understand he has done quite well.

Nevertheless, the sporting enthusiasm of Victorian clergy has become a victim of its own success. Sports promoted for fair play and sound morals to reinforce the Christian message have outgrown and left behind their Church roots. Whilst there are many Christians in sport, in some ways sport has become the religion, rather than an expression of the religion. Encouragingly sport does try and set a good example. Success is not success if it is gained by illegal or unfair means, but the power of money continues to grow and makes the playing field increasingly less even.

Sporting role models remain crucial because they are listened to by a wider constituency of the rebellious and disengaged than any clergy, Archbishops or not.

Here are some of the needs:

- ◇ **PCC members** - two more needed
- ◇ **Prayer** – join the confidential Prayer Circle
- ◇ **Money matters** – join the treasury team
- ◇ **Technology** – microphones and automatic door care etc and Zoom
- ◇ **Administration** – weekly notices, photocopying, keeping the back of church tidy etc
- ◇ **Sacristy** – ordering essentials by phone, changing altar frontals
- ◇ **Kitchen/Toilet Overseer** – check cleanliness (between Justin's monthly deep clean), check needs, keep tidy, dispose of recycling, change bin liners if needed
- ◇ **Intercessions** – three more needed (training supplied)
- ◇ **Opening and closing church** – reserves needed
- ◇ **Sunday morning transport** - reserves
- ◇ **Social activities** – helping to organise, baking, setting up/clearing up, coffee after 10.30am but also on other occasions eg Choral Evensong
- ◇ **Publicity** - when attending a church event, writing a few lines and taking a photo to send to the Easingwold Advertiser and the Parish Magazine, putting up posters
- ◇ **Visiting** – those living alone or who are sick
- ◇ **Christians Together Around Easingwold (CTAE)** – one or more to attend three meetings a year, advertise and help at joint events
- ◇ **Flowers** – join the rota – they can be flowers in a vase!
- ◇ **Bell ringing** – you can be taught
- ◇ **Singing** – it is great when we have a choir!

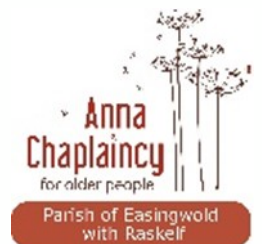

# DUNKIRK

As many will be aware, this year saw the 85th anniversary of Operation Dynamo when a fleet of many naval and civilian vessels took the perilous journey over the English Channel to Dunkirk to assist with the evacuation of the British Expeditionary Force of over 338,000 both British and French soldiers.

The evacuation took place between 26th May and 4th June 1940 when German forces passed through France trapping Allied troops on the beaches and although many were successfully evacuated, there were also many who lost their lives.

I went along on a two-day Leger tour to visit the area and have to confess that I had not appreciated just how far along the beaches the evacuation had taken place. It covered a length of around 10 miles.

On the Saturday morning of my visit, I attended a remembrance service when wreaths were laid at the memorial to those who perished. The weather was awful, the rain poured which made the occasion more poignant and, whilst I cannot begin to imagine how dire the situation was back in 1940, it made me think about how appallingly terrifying it must have been for our men as they were being attacked whilst desperately fleeing for their lives.



The tour included a visit to the Dunkirk War Museum close to the East Mole and evacuation beaches where the displays told the incredible story of Operation Dynamo.



may have made it back home to Easingwold.

It was an intense and most thought provoking two days which were summed up by our coach driver when, at the Dunkirk Ferry Port passport control a comment was made to him about the group “holiday”. His reply was that these are not holidays, more of an endurance test. He was not wrong!!!

I also visited Dunkirk Town Cemetery which contains 460 Commonwealth burials of the First World War and 793 from the Second World War. One of the graves is that of an Easingwold man, Private John Cowling of the Northumberland Fusiliers. He died in April 1919, not from war wounds but as a victim of the 1918 “Spanish Flu” pandemic otherwise, who knows, he

*In today's culture this is an opportunity of being together in a reflective mood including silence. After a brief period of spoken reflection we experience some reflective music. We then enter a period of silent meditation for about 20-25 minutes. Some people use a 4-beat mantra such as "Ma-ra-na-tha" (or Come Lord Jesus), said twice, (not out loud!) breathing in and then when breathing out. After this, another period of music precedes a final prayer. It doesn't suit everyone but it is something worth trying. Sometimes we have a few comments, even laughter, afterwards! In today's busy-ness people often find this simple and yet cathartic. Even children in school use silence as a restful experience!*
