
Mary is a wonderful inspiration and role model for us all. The world would have been very different if she had said no to the challenge that she received from God.



What is mission?

When we meet and have fellowship together, when we love and help one another, when we lift one another up in prayer and walk alongside each other in difficult times, we are living in the Kingdom of God and partnering with God in His mission.

We are all commissioned and sent by Jesus, as He says in Matthew 28:16-19 "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit".

We have been called by God to work with Him in the fulfilment of His purposes for humanity. With Christ's victory on the cross we can all come directly into God's presence but we also have the responsibility of bringing others to Him. When we become united with Christ we become members of His body, we join in His priestly work of reconciling man with God. God has created each one of us and given us individual gifts which, when used as a whole, build up the church of Christ.

Looking at Jesus' teaching on evangelism in Luke 10:5, 8 and 9 as He sends His disciples out, He advises them to speak peace into people's lives, if the person receives that peace, He then says spend time in fellowship with them, after that the disciples are encouraged to meet the needs of their hosts, then they are to proclaim the Good News and bringing them in to their own personal relationship with Jesus.

How do we, as a church, engage with the local community? Building up relationships is a really important first step for us and hospitality is one of our strengths.

Last year, we had some very successful events; for example, the quiz night, the talent competition, the curry night and Allan Green's picture night.

It is also really important to have a culture of invitation, every time we have an event we must be encouraged to invite someone who doesn't regularly come to our church.

I strongly believe that, in order to engage in mission outreach, we cover our endeavours with prayer; before we even start to consider any new outreach, the first thing is to pray, to listen and to seek God's heart on whatever we are planning to do. Offering it to Him and asking for His blessing—please use the prayer on the inside front cover of the magazine.

Mary Sumner

On August 9th, Mothers' Union members celebrate the life of the founder of their organisation. Mary Sumner was inspired to form a group of women after the birth of her first grandchild. Remembering her own difficulties when she was a mother, she felt that by bringing women together they could support one another.

Mary died in 1921 at the age of 92 and is buried with her husband in the grounds of Winchester Cathedral. The inscription on their tomb is from Revelations 14:13 and reads:



I heard a voice from Heaven saying unto me

Write Blessed are the dead which died in the Lord from henceforth.

Here, saith the Spirit, they may rest from their labours,

And their works do follow them

The Mothers' Union is now a global movement within the Anglican Church and the current Worldwide President is Sheran Harper who lives in Guyana.

Shoe Boxes 2019

It's that time of year again when we are beginning to think about filling shoe boxes for Samaritan's Purse. These boxes are so appreciated by the children who receive them and we send them to a variety of countries overseas.



- The supplied boxes (and information leaflets) will be available next month from the back of church, or you can cover an ordinary shoe box with Christmas paper if you prefer.
- ◆ There are five categories of gifts that can be included in your box to wear (e.g. hats and gloves); to eat (sweets must have a far ahead best before date; no chocolate as it melts!); toiletries (e.g. soap, toothpaste); anything educational (e.g. pens, paper, colouring books); and something for fun (e.g. small toy, hair clips). Please look at the back of church for items given by others to be used to help fill your box especially knitteds from the Knit and Natter Group and friends of the church.
- Please read the leaflet carefully as there are some items which cannot be included e.g. liquids of any kind, stuffed hand-knitted toys and war toys.

There will be no charge for the empty box but if you are able to include the suggested donation for transport that would be helpful. HOWEVER, if that is too much to ask when you are providing the contents of your box don't worry, still fill your box.

Online Donations



Visitors to our website **easingwoldraskelfanglican.org** will now see the option to make donations to the Parish via the secure payments portal **give.net**. We have registered with Stewardship, an organisation that has been providing advice, guidance, inspiration and practical tools to churches, secular and Christian charities since 1906.

This is a new venture for us that could provide an additional stream of income. Donations between £1 and £1,000,000 can be made although the higher amount is perhaps a little too optimistic! Give.net will collect the donation, for a small fee of 3%, claim the Gift Aid automatically and transfer the monies to the church's bank account. The Church of England has been promoting a "digital conversion" with cashless donations being available in parishes. Some churches are now allowing contactless card payments due to the declining numbers of people carrying cash. One step at a time!
