

VJ DAY – AUGUST 2020



A special service was held on 16th August to commemorate the 75th anniversary of VJ Day (15th August). Due to the pandemic restrictions, only vicar Rev'd Margaret Young and Rev'd Lottie Cranfield were in the church, along with organist Peter Smith, Gina Smith to lead the singing, and Tim Young to handle the technology! All were suitably socially distanced there, while the rest of us followed the service on 'Zoom'.

We were welcomed by Margaret, who started by laying a wreath at the altar. After the opening hymn: "O God our Help in Ages Past", the service was structured round the themes of: 'Act of Remembrance', 'Exhortation', 'Responsory', 'Prayers' and 'An Act of Commitment'. We heard readings of Scripture from Micah and the Gospel according to Luke, and the poems: "Hiroshima Child" and "VJ Day, Khanburi". The hymns included "I Vow to Thee my Country" and "Now Thank we all Our God".

A video recording of the service held at the Easingwold War Memorial the previous day was shown as well as videos of "VJ Day across the World" and "War Museum VJ Day 1945".



There followed prayers of 'A Collect for Peace, 'A Prayer for the Sovereign' and 'A Prayer for Peace and Reconciliation'. After singing The National Anthem, Margaret gave The Blessing and we ended with the hymn: "Guide me O Thou Great Redeemer". Margaret concluded by thanking everyone involved in making the two events happen, mentioning especially John Cleaver of the Easingwold Branch of the Royal British Legion.

CHURCH OFFICE HOLDERS TARGETED BY GIFT CARD EMAIL SCAM

North Yorkshire Police is warning local residents to be vigilant for an email scam in which the sender claims to be the local reverend and asks the recipient to purchase high value Amazon gift cards on their behalf.

Church wardens, treasurers and volunteers have been targeted, with some emails claiming to be from the Archbishop of York. The initial email follows a standard format and reads:

"Do you have a moment I have a request I need you to handle discreetly. I am currently busy in a prayer session, no calls so just reply my email."

Then, if the recipient enters into a dialogue they will be asked to purchase Amazon gift cards as 'thank you' presents for members of the church family. The scammer provides reassurances that the money will be reimbursed and asks the individual to send photos of the gift cards or vouchers which allows them to collect the unique codes and use the cards to make online purchases.

Anyone receiving these emails should report it to North Yorkshire Police by calling 101.

Never trust any unsolicited emails from the Vicar or other church office holders where the request, language or style of writing is atypical of the alleged sender. If in doubt, recipients must not reply to suspicious emails or click on any links or attachments in it. Instead, please contact the relevant church office holder using the contact details published on the church website and in the magazine.

Samaritans' Purse Shoe Box Appeal 2020

This year has brought new challenges, hasn't it? Many things we were looking forward to in 2020 have been cancelled - from the Olympics to school graduation celebrations. Children around the world, especially those in contexts of poverty, have struggled with this uncertainty and sadly sometimes grief.



With so many ongoing challenges for many families, let's remind the world's children that they are loved and special to God. A **shoebox gift** through Operation Christmas Child does just that, while bringing a great big smile to the face of all those little ones who receive them. This organisation is intending to continue this excellent work, through their contacts on the ground, and we intend to send as many boxes as we are able despite the current situation.

The boxes have been ordered and will be available from **Sunday 6th September**.

If possible please collect your box and leaflet from **the Parish Church porch or from 11 Whiteoak Avenue**. If you are unable to collect (or have any other queries) please ring Chris on 01347 823548 to arrange a delivery. The filled box needs to be returned to either place by **Sunday 1st November**.

GIFT IDEAS – please include one or more items from each category if at all possible.

FUN/TOYS - Include items that children will immediately embrace such as dolls or cuddly toys, toy trucks, harmonica, yo-yo, skipping rope, ball, small puzzles, wind up torch, slinky spring, matchbox cars etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES - Pens, pencils & sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks & paper, solar calculators, colouring & picture books etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS - Toothbrush, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel.

TO WEAR - Hat, cap, gloves or scarf, sunglasses, hair accessories, jewellery set.

N.B. Due to more stringent import regulations, toothpaste and sweets can no longer be included in shoeboxes. Also, used, damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives or military figures; seeds; chocolate or food items; lotions or liquids including bubbles; medicines; playing cards of the 4-suit variety; religious or political literature; sharp or fragile items; books with mainly words cannot be included and will be removed if you include them.

There will be no charge for the empty box but if you are able to include the suggested donation (£5) in the leaflet for transport that would be helpful. HOWEVER, if that is too much to ask when you are providing the contents of your box don't worry, still fill your box. If you are not able to fill a box perhaps you could give a £5 donation to help with transport costs.

I have taken on the organising role for this year from Dr Gaynor Cole, who has successfully organised this work for many years and to whom we extend our thanks. If you feel you can help in any way I would be very glad to hear from you on 01347 823548.

ELECTORAL ROLL

The Electoral Roll (ER) is a list of those in the benefice entitled to vote in the election of certain parish officers (for example the Churchwardens and members of the PCC). In essence, under the Church Representation Rules to be included in the ER you must be baptised and aged 16 or over, and be a member of the Church of England or a church in communion with it, or be a member of another church which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity. You should also be resident in the parish or have attended worship regularly during the previous six months.

I am currently updating the Electoral Roll in preparation for the delayed Annual Parochial Church Meeting, currently scheduled for October. I have approached those who are not currently on the ER, and whom I believe may wish to be included, but if you are in any doubt do please get in touch, (01347 823548) and I will be delighted to take any necessary action.



THE FUTURE FOR THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND

As John Hetherington referred to in the article in the August magazine, a return to some form of “normality” is likely to be completely different from anything we have ever experienced before. For it appears that we are going to have to learn to live with this coronavirus. Iris and I are now both in our 90’s, and the likelihood is that our essential safeguarding means we will never again in our lifetime be able to enter a church building for a Eucharist service or indeed even to receive Holy Communion at home. In addition to us, there are many in our congregations at the Parish Churches who are well over 70 and should also be carefully safeguarding.

So where does the future lie? I remember some 50 years ago, when I was a member of the General Synod, I addressed one of the meetings of the Synod in Westminster about this very subject. I said that we should be thinking even then about the future organisation of the Church to meet modern reality and thereby proclaim the Good News more effectively. I asked who in their right senses in the 20th century (as it then was) would set up a police force or fire brigade by sending individual policemen with truncheons or firemen with buckets and hoses to look after individual groups of villages. That was probably alright for the 18th and perhaps 19th centuries, but could not serve modern life. Is there not a parallel to be drawn with the organisation of the Church of England, with clergy dotted all about the countryside? I suggested that the present system reached perhaps up to 5% of the population, plus those attending baptisms, weddings and funerals who were never seen again. Needless to say, my plea so long ago to the General Synod came to nought!

So where do we go now? Where should we direct our resources to make more impact? The majority of us cannot worship, huddled round our computer screens, with services transmitted by Zoom. There may be some who really can, and I applaud them. But I think the Americans have been able to see the opportunity of making contact with the masses on the radio and TV, with numerous stations and channels broadcasting the Gospel, perhaps sometimes in forms we don’t understand or fully appreciate. Indeed, there is already one channel on our Freeview system which has such American-style evangelism. The really excellent news is that the Church of England each Sunday at 9am is broadcasting an Anglican Eucharist on YouTube and Facebook. This can be received on the ordinary television set by inserting a simple one-off gadget. Now that is a small step in the right direction! Iris and I can join in with the worshippers at these Eucharists. At the middle of July it was the Archbishop celebrating at York Minster, followed the next week by a celebration from the Anglican Church in Brussels within the Diocese of Gibraltar and Europe. More recently there was the Eucharist from the Anglican Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham, when Fr Kevin Smith, yes, Kevin, our very own fully-trained Easingwold ordinand/priest, was officiating.

So what of the future? Are we inevitably going to see a return to small house groups, meeting together to worship and support each other, as the first Christians did? If so, are we gradually going to move towards unpaid priests earning their living in the community being the norm, thereby releasing the large funds of the Church for other ways of furthering the spread of the Gospel? Perhaps we also look again at the relatively large numbers engaged in the clerical and lay bureaucracy of the Church? Then perhaps we could use the freed funds to buy time for Sunday services on one of the mainstream TV channels? Perhaps even having weekday evening services on a radio station, featuring the best of our preachers?

Or perhaps the Christian denominations could together actually launch their own radio station and TV channel to reach out to the millions of the faithful, as well as proclaiming the Good News to large numbers of other listeners and viewers? Is it possible that we can take an increasing role in the provision of hospices? Or perhaps in the mental health area? For these were the very foundations of medieval provision for those in need, thereby showing the love of God in action rather than in words. What a lot lies ahead of us, although I will certainly not live long enough to see what happens. But change is inevitable. And perhaps it is an opportunity that God trusts we will not miss.

So, come on, give us your ideas about the Church of the future. What shape should it take? Where should it be heading? How can it react to an increasingly secular world? Or are we content just to return in small numbers to the church buildings, booking our places, practising social distancing, wearing face masks and giving up any singing in case we breathe too heavily? We must and should do better. I know I will not be popular with everyone for raising these issues, but face them we must.
