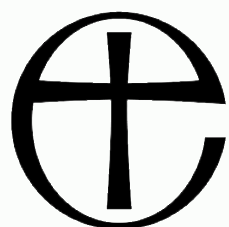

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From Laura Varney, our Church Warden



The last time I wrote a letter for the magazine we were in interregnum. It's lovely to have the opportunity to do it again, secure in the knowledge that Richard will be returning after his short break.

In September we celebrate Harvest and our thoughts instinctively turn to nature. We thank God for all His good gifts; gifts we receive daily and often take for granted – our food, our health, our surrounding countryside. We think of the sunshine and the rain that allows our crops to grow, and we take time to be thankful.

This year I have been thinking about seeds – wildflower seeds for an area of my garden. I have been watching plants and trees shed their seeds during the hot, dry summer, as they struggled to survive the difficult conditions.

My attention has been drawn to the variety of shapes and sizes of seeds: tiny poppy seeds; acorns nestling in their cups; beechnuts; horse chestnut conkers; helicopters from sycamore trees. Each seed, regardless of size or shape, holds the potential for a new plant, given the right conditions. Some are not fussy – dandelions, daisies, and sunflowers that are often planted by wind and rain and even birds. Others are quite particular – I have an agapanthus that I lavish care on, moving it in its pot around my patio to ensure just the right amount of sun and shade, watering it, but not too often. Each flower and tree demands different conditions and produces different results.

In my imagination, we are like seeds. We are all different shapes and sizes, but each of us holds the potential to be the best version of ourselves and with our different skills and talents, we can come together to create something very special indeed.

We've been charged with taking care of God's creation and that means striking a balance, creating space for the tidy fussy plants, but also allowing room for the haphazard dandelions and daisies. Thus, we encourage small animals and birds to thrive. We provide food for the bees, who in turn pollinate our fruit trees and our crops, providing food for us. In God's world there is room for all.

A REMINDER OF WHAT'S COMING UP IN DECEMBER

The service commemorates the baptism of King Edwin of Northumbria by Bishop Paulinus in York in AD 627. Tradition holds that Paulinus later baptised some 10,000 people in the River Swale at nearby Brafferton. (*Vallis Eboracensis, comprising the History & Antiquities of Easingwold and the Forest of Galtres*, Thomas Gill, 1852.)

Chaplain's Corner



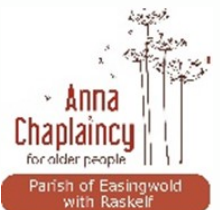
Once again Hazel, Christina, Caroline, Julia and I have been racking our brains to come up with a list of social events for the forthcoming **You & Me** year which starts this month.

THE CHURCH TODAY AND TOMORROW

I recently visited a friend who gave me her local church magazine to read, which had in it a most interesting letter from the new Bishop of Durham, Bishop Rick Simpson.

Bishop Rick recognises the challenges which the Church faces today, saying that if the hugely valuable worship, witness and service of many of our local churches is going to be sustained in the next generation, we need God by his Holy Spirit to renew us. He suggests that we are experiencing not something random in the decline and struggles of the Church of today, but a moment in history. It is the out-working of trends in history long in motion. A world which was, for many centuries, broadly and mainly Christian, has been coming to an end. Today we cannot presume that because people are British that they are Christian.

Bishop Rick suggests that churches and ministers geared largely for being pastors to a basically Christian population have been poorly equipped to be missionary disciples. We therefore need to nurture and train ministers who can share faith in a way that is beautiful, compelling and real for those who do not know that Christ has risen. However, this isn't to abandon pastoral care, presence and social action. Both are equally important.

We need then to recognise that we human beings can't actually do this ourselves. But God by his Holy Spirit can do it. Our part is to pray without ceasing that God will renew his Church in this country. Bishop Rick asks us to join him in this.

However imperfect the Christianity of previous centuries often was, millions of people came to a faith in Christ which gave them strength in trials, comfort in sorrow, hope for the future, and a moral vision which shaped our nation. This has largely gone which is a huge loss.

However, we in the parishes do have the chance to show the difference Christ makes. To become a church of missionary disciples, we need to learn more deeply who we are, grow in our discipleship and our ability to live and share a life-giving faith. As well as praying, we will need to support our ministers as we face the changes that will need to be made. Through it all we will see God at work as we love and care for one another.

THE IMPORTANCE OF THANKSGIVING

Many of you, like us, will have been brought up to say "Thank you" – for a happening in your life, a gift and so forth. Sometimes we didn't feel like saying it when it wasn't the gift we had hoped for but we said it nevertheless out of love for the other. Saying "Thank you" helps to build relationships of love with those around us. So, our regular offering of thanksgiving to God affirms our desire to remain in a loving relationship with Him, and never to take Him for granted.

But as human beings we cannot always feel thankful. How are we to give thanks when our lives are torn apart by tragedy, loss, humiliation or failure? We feel we cannot give thanks when a loved one dies. We cannot give thanks that they are no longer with us, but we can give thanks for their life, that they no longer are suffering; that we manage to keep going despite our suffering and for the comfort and support of family and friends; and for occasional moments of awareness of God's presence with us in our sorrow.

As we look back at the end of each day – even if it has seemed an awful one - there is always something we can be thankful for – the sun shining its warmth, a beautiful spider's web, a tasty morsel enjoyed, the smile of a stranger, the caring of a friend. And as we look back on our lives and perceive with hindsight, how we have been held and led, even in tragedy and failure, we too may gradually find ourselves able to say, "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is gracious, and his mercy endures for ever.

In today's culture this is an opportunity of being together in a reflective mood including silence. After a brief period of spoken reflection we experience some reflective music. We then enter a period of silent meditation for about 20-25 minutes. Some people use a 4-beat mantra such as 'Ma-ra-na-tha' (or Come Lord Jesus), said twice, (not out loud!) breathing in and then when breathing out. After this, another period of music precedes a final prayer. It doesn't suit everyone but it is something worth trying. Sometimes we have a few comments, even laughter, afterwards! In today's busyness people often find this simple and yet cathartic. Even children in school use silence as a restful experience!

Perhaps give it a try? Join us, you are most welcome.
