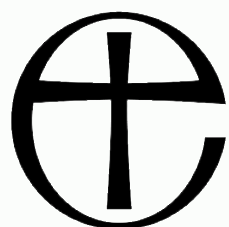

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From Rev'd Richard Grant



As I write, we have just celebrated the feast of St Ninian. One of his favourite metaphors was that of God's light shining in the darkness of the world.

At this time of year, the image feels particularly close to home. The evenings draw in earlier, the mornings can begin in darkness, and the bright, long days of summer already seem like a distant memory. We notice the darkness around us in a very literal way. Yet this changing season also gives us an opportunity to think about another kind of darkness, and about what it means to carry the light of Christ into the world.

St Ninian was a missionary and evangelist who brought the Christian faith to people in what is now Scotland and northern England. He settled at Whithorn, in Galloway, where he built a small church and painted it bright white to represent the light in the darkness which he sought to bring. His ministry reminds us that sharing the light is not always about doing something dramatic or extraordinary. Sometimes it is simply about being willing to go where there is darkness and to bring with us the hope, love and compassion that we have received from Christ.

Jesus tells us, "You are the light of the world." It is a remarkable thing to be told that we can be light for others. We may sometimes feel that our own light is very small. We might wonder what difference one person can make in a world where there is so much suffering, loneliness, uncertainty and division.

But a small light can make a real difference in the darkness.

A kind word to someone who is struggling. A cup of tea and a listening ear. A visit to someone who is lonely. A welcome offered to someone who feels like an outsider. A willingness to forgive. A prayer for someone in need. These may seem like small things, but they can shine much further than we realise.

Being light in the world is not about having all the answers, but it is about being present. It is about reflecting something of God's love in the way we treat the people we meet each day. We do not have to illuminate the whole world; we simply need to let God's light shine through us where we are.

As the darkness comes earlier and the mornings begin in shadow, may we remember that Christians are called not to hide from the darkness, but to bring light into it. St Ninian's example encourages us to carry the light of faith beyond the walls of our church and into the places where we live, work and meet others.

So, as we journey through these darker months, let us look for opportunities to be people of light. Let us notice those who need encouragement, welcome those who need belonging, and bring hope wherever we can.

How patient are you?

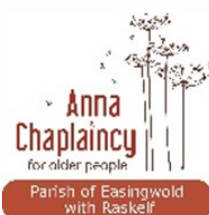

Today it offers a chance to hear a more unusual side of Schumann which is powerful, lyrical and deeply expressive.

The programme also includes excerpts from **Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition**, one of classical music's great feats of musical storytelling. Inspired by an exhibition of paintings and designs by Viktor Hartmann, the music takes us from playful and bustling scenes to dark catacombs and the spectacular *Great Gate of Kyiv*.

THE CHURCH TODAY AND TOMORROW

Following last month's thoughts from the Bishop of Durham, and having read an article from The Times by Angela Tilby, whom I have known for some years, and whose opinions I believe are worthwhile, I share with you a slightly different look at the problem the Church of today is facing.

Angela believes that evangelicalism, largely influenced by American revivalists, has shaped the Church of England since the mid-20th century. Where there have been charismatic leaders with great enthusiasm, church congregations have grown, but often to the detriment of other churches nearby. Central church funding was supplied, **only** if proposals could demonstrate a plan for growth, often relying on innovative forms of worship and the attempt to forge new kinds of church community. However, the result of this has been that in many dioceses the broad and inclusive Church of England has come to resemble a much more driven sect of religious enthusiasts, who see their primary role as evangelism rather than pastoral care. Angela says, "A revival of the C of E is possible and there are even signs of its dawning. Mystery, spirituality, the awe inspired by ancient buildings, resonant liturgy and music, a sense of place and a new recognition of the significance of the parish may yet provide resources to meet the moral and spiritual challenges England faces".

So perhaps, listening to both points of view, we can move forward by returning to steeping ourselves in Biblical teaching – especially the words and actions of Jesus – and thus gaining the confidence to share our faith with others in the wider community. Alongside this pastorally caring for all whom we meet in the process, **and** those beyond.

CONFESSION

“Make me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.” Psalm 51

In one way we can see that repentance is, or ought to be, simplicity itself. All we have to do is to throw ourselves at God's feet in penitence and receive the forgiveness, mercy and peace that have been freely promised to us. That is true, yet sometimes we find this particular kind of prayer very difficult, for it is not really a single prayer, but a process and we may get stuck at either end of it! We may not perceive that we are sinning, and so we cannot confess; or, having confessed, we may not be able to allow ourselves to accept forgiveness. This is a process that takes time in God's presence.

The first stage is **Admission**. We need to allow ourselves to perceive not just what we have done or not done, but what the flaws and muddles and conflicts are in our inner being. This is not a matter of morbid introspection but of desiring to share our lives with God as truthfully as we can – of humbly sitting with God and allowing his light to permeate our responses. When we find ourselves repeatedly falling short in a particular area, we need to ask why. We realise, that before we say the prayer of confession, perhaps we need to prepare ourselves to do so.

Secondly comes the prayer of **Contrition**, when we are truly sorry for the sinner we are. The love which gives rise to the sorrow of contrition is also the love which gives us the assurance of forgiveness, and saves us from despair.

Thirdly comes **Seeking and Accepting Forgiveness**. When we have truly confessed we can ask for God's forgiveness with quiet trust. Yet there is still one condition as we ask, “Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.” As we pray for ourselves, we should remember those who are trapped in bitterness or other difficulty and feel unable to forgive.

Let us give thanks that in Christ we have been given ***“the means of grace and the hope of glory”***. Our lives are in safe hands.

DOREEN HAYES

By now, many of you will know that Doreen died peacefully in hospital on 31st August, at the age of 89. She had spent her latter years as a resident at Springhill Court, where she was cared for by the wonderful staff there. Her funeral will be on Monday 12th October at St John the Baptist and All Saints church at 11am.

Doreen loved music of all genres, and many will remember her record department in Smith's electrical shop in the Market Place. She had trained at EMI in London and I, amongst others, spent many a Saturday afternoon back in the 1960s browsing the collections where I bought my first vinyl LPs and 45 rpm records.

A long-standing member of our church, Doreen faithfully worked for and supported its mission. In her earlier years she was a much-loved Sunday School teacher and later served as a PCC member, churchwarden, sacristan and choir member. The credence table now used in our church was given by Doreen in celebration of her 80th birthday. She was also, for many years, a member of the Mothers' Union.

Doreen loved the Royal Family and, in 2012, had the great honour of being presented with Maundy Money by HM Queen Elizabeth II at York Minster.

Sadly, in recent years Doreen lived with dementia. Yet her knowledge of local and family history remained, and I had many conversations with her in which she would identify people in old family photographs.

I'm sure those who knew Doreen will have their own memories of her. Let us remember her with love and gratitude for all that she gave to our church and community, and take comfort in knowing that she can now rest in peace.

In today's culture this is an opportunity of being together in a reflective mood including silence. After a brief period of spoken reflection we experience some reflective music. We then enter a period of silent meditation for about 20-25 minutes. Some people use a 4-beat mantra such as 'Ma-ra-na-tha' (or Come Lord Jesus), said twice, (not out loud!) breathing in and then when breathing out. After this, another period of music precedes a final prayer. It doesn't suit everyone but it is something worth trying. Sometimes we have a few comments, even laughter, afterwards! In today's busyness people often find this simple and yet cathartic. Even children in school use silence as a restful experience!
